

Our last game against highly placed Golcar United, and our first of 2025, saw the Swans supporters "enjoy" the full range of emotions as first we fell behind in the first few minutes, equalise and then go in at half time two goals ahead, only to concede a second with 15 minutes to play. There was a huge turnout and it showed the level of respect James had earned at the various clubs he had played for, and the friendships he had made in his comparatively short life.

AMWORTH's heroics aside, the most romantic story of FA Cup third round weekend was one which never actually materialised. In 154 years of the competition, no father and son have ever played against each other, so when Premier League Everton pulled Peterborough United out of the hat, all talk was of the possibility of Everton full-back Ashley Young facing his 18-year-old son Tyler.

Tyler was named on the Posh bench but, in the end, a tight game at Goodison Park meant that Peterborough boss Darren Ferguson had to put the needs of his team before the purists and the young midfielder didn't get on.

And in another twist to the tale, Ashley's brother, and Tyler's uncle, Lewis Young took charge of only his second game as caretaker manager, leading out Dagenham & Redbridge at Millwall on Monday night.

Despite not quite etching their names in cup folklore, it proved a memorable weekend for the Young family – one to tell the grandchildren one day. "It was fantastic to be there [at Everton] on Thursday night," Lewis told The NLP. It was a dream for me and the whole family all dotted around. We probably ended up making it nearly a sell out because the amount of us went up."



Ask any footballer of a certain age and they'll tell you it's every player's dream to see their son or daughter make their own way in the game – better still playing alongside them. And that was the case for two former full-time stalwarts who lined up alongside their sons in Non-League last week.

Ronnie Henry says he has fulfilled the final ambition of his 23-year playing career after playing alongside son Louie for Potters Bar. Stevenage legend Henry, 41, joined the Scholars in June after watching 17-year-old Louie play at the Lantern on loan from his former club last season. The centre-back even admitted that the possibility of left-back Louie returning to the Isthmian Premier division side had convinced him not to hang up his boots. Henry was made to sweat, with talk of loan moves elsewhere, but the deal was completed last week and on Tuesday night the pair lined up in Max Mitchell's back four, helping the Scholars to a 2-1 win at Canvey Island.

"I've achieved quite a few things in my career, but playing alongside Louie is right up there with any of them," Henry, who won two FA Trophies, a Conference title and the League Two play-offs during two glittering spells at the Lamex, told The NLP.





"When I decided to play on for another year, it did depend on what Louie was going to do. And at times it looked like he would go elsewhere. So for him to come to Potters Bar and for me to play alongside him was a special, special moment.

"It's a moment that I didn't think was ever going to happen. I didn't even dream of it happening, to be honest. Even driving to the game, I thought 'This is surreal'. But when we crossed that white line, everything just felt really natural. It was a fantastic experience and it almost feels like 'OK, I've achieved everything I could have hoped for in football now."

Someone who knows exactly how Henry is feeling right now is Danny Kedwell. The Ashford United player/manager says it's an "amazing feeling" to partner his son in the Nuts & Bolts front line in the Isthmian South East division – even though he'd really rather not to!

Kedwell has been forced to dust down his predatory scoring boots in recent weeks at the age of 41 to cover an injury and suspension crisis at the Homelands, which has propelled his 16-year-old schoolboy son Preston into the spotlight having netted three goals in his first six starts in senior football.





"He's only 16, he's still at school, so to get experience of men's football at his age is fantastic," said Kedwell Snr, who scored over 250 career goals for the likes of AFC Wimbledon, Gillingham and Ebbsfleet United. In all my footballing career, I never thought I would ever be playing alongside my son.

"It's an amazing feeling, albeit unexpected because I don't really want to be playing at 41 to be honest! But with all the injuries and suspensions we've had, I had no choice. I was buzzing for him, because it's hard for him being 16 years of age and the manager's son.

"It's an easy option not to play him but he doesn't deserve that. He's had six starts this season and got three goals. As a manager, if I think you are good enough to play then you'll play, and I'll treat you the same as anyone else.

"When it comes to matchday, he's just a normal player. He's deserved his start like anyone else. He's been patient and every time he's come on he's done really well.

"He's a natural goalscorer. He knows where the goal is and has a habit of being in the right place at the right time, You just can't buy that."

Much of its early football was played in the York & District League before joining the Northern League in 1909. After only two seasons, escalating costs forced a move back to the York League and Harrogate League through the 1920's and 30's.

periods, a club has existed in the town.

At the outbreak of World War Two, the club, like many at the time, folded temporarily, and it was as Knaresborough Rovers that they reformed in 1946. The Harrogate League was the first competition played until the early 1950's when the York League was joined once more.

The club again reverted to the Harrogate League when they set up a Premier Division and that title was won three years in succession from 1965 to 1967. After two more runners-up seasons, the club entered the West Yorkshire League for six further years which saw a title in Division Two before promotion from Division One for two seasons in the Premier Division before another return to the Harrogate League.

From 1976 to 1993, the club continued in the Harrogate League but ambitions were high and





the West Yorkshire League was rejoined in 1993. The League Cup was won in the first season, but the league title had to wait until 2009.

In 2010, the club won the West Riding County F.A. Challenge Cup final for the first and only time and then made the decision to invest in ground developments to upgrade to Step Six standards, and were elected to the Northern Counties East League in 2012.

The club built steadily, the early highlight being the triumph in the League Cup in 2014 when Eccleshill United were defeated at Bradford City's Valley Parade ground.

2017-18 saw progression for the club when they reached the 2nd round of the FA Vase for the first time and went on to take the NCEL Division One title and achieve promotion to Step 5 of the Non-League pyramid.

2018 saw the club's best FA Cup run as they reached the Second Qualifying round only to bow out to Workington.

In 2024, the team achieved its highest place to date, finishing 8th in the NCEL Premier Division.

History

We never seem to do much good against Knaresborough, and last season was no exception.

Our away game saw plenty of goals. Knaresborough took an early lead, with Harrison Coley equalising for Barton on 15 minutes. Knaresborough restored their lead a few minutes later and added a third not long after. They added a fourth just after the break. Two late goals from Tom Waudby could not stop the inevitable defeat for Barton. Thirteen games later, in just eight weeks, saw Barton lose again, this time at home by three goals to nil at home.

Back in September this season, two penalties were the only goals in our away game at Knaresborough. Tom Waudby getting one on 69 minutes and Knaresborough getting theirs right at the end of the game. A draw was an improvement, but it was so close to a win.

Let's hope for a good game today and up the Swans.

The Other Team

The European Cup final of 1960 is, by many, considered to be the greatest game of football ever played. Real Madrid secured their fifth European title in five years, the first five years of the competition. The legendary Alfredo di Stefano scored a hat trick, but was outdone by his teammate Ferenc Puskas who scored four. A massive 127,000 were in attendance in Glasgow, among them Alex Ferguson, and many times that have claimed to have been there. And Real Madrid manager Miguel Munoz had only been in the job for a month, though he would stay for 14 years. But there was another side in that final, and Eintracht Frankfurt came within 90 minutes of upsetting the footballing order.

Frankfurt were a provincial team with no history of success. Any impetus they were beginning to gain in the first half of the twentieth century was snuffed out by the rise of Nazism, and at the end of the war they took their place as an average side in their regional league. Football before the

Bundesliga saw the winners of regional divisions qualify for national playoffs, which Frankfurt managed in 1953 and, crucially, 1959.



In 1960, many associations still refused to acknowledge the European Cup, and so thanks to the withdrawal of their Finnish opponents in the first round Frankfurt's first foray into continental competition was against Swiss opposition. Young Boys were three times Swiss champions and well-versed in football at this level, and were expected to win.

A rain soaked first leg saw Young Boys' ground only three quarters full. The Swiss champions entered the game with confidence, but after just four minutes Hans Weilbacher fired a free kick past the despairing goalkeeper. The home side equalised, but in the final quarter of the

match Frankfurt went on the rampage, first with a twenty yard strike and then a penalty to all but secure qualification. A fourth, late on, confirmed it, and Frankfurt ensured the second leg was a stodgy 1-1 draw.

Tougher opponents awaited in the next round. Wiener Sport-Club, the Austrian champions from Vienna, came to Frankfurt for the first leg of their quarter finals, and were far more solid than their Swiss counterparts. They reckoned without winger Erich Meier, however, who chose this game to display his brilliance down the left. He created the first goal after 17 minutes, and was a constant threat throughout the game. Sport-Club equalised before half time, but on the hour Meier danced through the defence yet again, placing a shot in the corner. Frankfurt held on to take a valuable lead into the second leg.

An energy sapping Derby against Offenbacher was between the games, which Frankfurt won 3-2 but was hardly the best preparation for an important European tie three days later. Sport-Club knew they needed a goal, and pushed forward hard. It took half an hour for them to level the tie, and at half time a tired Frankfurt feared their journey was over. Tired legs continued to defend resolutely, and then Erwin Stein had his moment. The ball broke to him in the Viennese' half, and he sprinted past the defence, powering home a finish. Frankfurt

held on, and progressed. The first time a German side had gone this far in the competition.

The semi-final saw them drawn against an enthusiastic Rangers. The final in Glasgow was a serious carrot for the Scots, and they were determined to beat their Catholic rivals in becoming the first Scottish side to win the European Cup. Rangers had won their domestic league 30 times by this point, and were renowned across the continent. Frankfurt had won their league just once, and were barely known beyond their city. Rangers players put bets on how many goals they would win by, foretelling their hubris. That was a serious mistake.



The first leg was a massacre, but the first half was tense, with each side scoring once before the break. Six minutes after the break, however, Alfred Pfaff nutmegged the goalkeeper to restore the Germans' lead. Four minutes later, he got his second. Rangers pressed forward, leaving

themselves open, and on 75 minutes conceded again to all but end the tie. And keeper George Niven was apoplectic. His mood was not helped by conceding twice more, as the overconfident Scottish champions lost 6-1. Another six goals conceded in the second leg, losing 6-3, put the seal on Rangers miserable semi-final. In Germany, the victory was celebrated so completely that Adidas took out adverts showing the side wearing their boots.

The magical ending would elude the Germans, however. In front of 127,000 people, with an estimated 70 million watching at home, they took the lead, but merely annoyed the Spanish giants. Puskas, Di Stefano, Paco Gento, there was just too much quality in the side. Possibly the greatest array of attacking talent to that point put Frankfurt to the sword and scored six before they conceded again. Frankfurt were disappointed, but not shamed.

As so often in football, the gods did not give us the fairytale, and Real Madrid won another European Cup.
