The end of the NCEL campaign is almost upon us with just one final home game to be played that's when we welcome Tadcaster Albion in two weeks time... on exactly though as it's a Friday night match and coincides with the Comic Relief Red Nose Day. There will be three further away matches to be played after that final home game as circumstances required a couple of the games to rescheduled

Of course Barton Town IS MORE than just the First Team and the Reserves will still be playing their matches in the Lincolnshire League with their last match here at the Easy Buy Stadium on Saturday 19th April.

This Sunday with a 10:45am kick-off, the Under 18 squad are taking on Bottesford Town Under 18 in the Lincolnshire Under 18 County Cup Semi-Final.

This match is taking place on the 3G pitch at Baysgarth School on Barrow Road. The winners will then face either Grantham Town or Appleby Frodingham in the Final on Thursday 24th April at Lincoln United's Sun-Hat Villas & Resorts Stadium. It would be a great opportunity to get to see and support the Barton Town players of the future who have had a great season already in the Lincolnshire Intermediate North League.

I believe I "promised" you news on the pitch drainage process, and I was hoping that we would have received confirmation and the go ahead by now, but... the wheels of the grant application or turning a bit more slowly that we would have hoped and we have been asked to supply further information. However I've been told we will have a further update in the coming week so by my next notes I'm expecting to be able to provide some concrete details.

At the moment the works schedule is pencilled in on the contractor's diary; the actual installation will take two weeks but we then need to allow the pitch to "settle in" for up to 10 weeks which will affect our normal pre-season games planning if we can't make a start as soon as possible. If there is any further delay it may not be possible to get the work done this summer, and keep our fingers crossed for another mild and dry winter.

Today we take on Rossington Main who sit a couple of spots above in the Premier Division. I'm looking forward to the match and securing three points... UP THE SWANS!

A LITTLE more than 11 miles separate Aldershot Town and Woking with the rivals sharing some epic encounters down the years.

We could be in for another next month when the duo meet at the Shots' EBB Stadium in the Isuzu FA Trophy semi-final – a place at Wembley on the line.

Aldershot have never played at the home of English football. Woking have lifted the Trophy three times, although not since 1997. It's a huge game guaranteed to command a full house.

Aldershot beat Sittingbourne 3-0 in the quarterfinals, finally ending the Step 4 side's remarkable campaign that saw them beat National League Southend United in the last 16.

"A lot of teams from divisions above Sittingbourne have fallen on their sword," Aldershot boss Tommy Widdrington said. "They have had an



unbelievable run and we were under no illusions. We knew it wasn't going to be a walk in the park."

Woking certainly had no stroll in their quarter at Oxford City. Needing a late Inih Effiong equaliser to make it 2-2 and force penalties, the two sides then shared a miss-filled shoot-out. The Cards won it 2-1 after keeper Will Jaaskelainen saved three of Oxford's four misses before planting home the winner himself.

"I am standing here due to fantastic goalkeeping heroics and even then we nearly blew them through the penalties, and I am really flat we were that bad," an irked Woking boss Neal Ardley admitted.



Spennymoor Town led the headlines on Saturday evening. Main man Glen Taylor scored twice as the National League North side dumped out Step 1 Sutton United.



"It's hard work winning football games, it hurts and it's painful, but when you get a result like that it's worth it," boss Graeme Lee said.

Spenny will face Rochdale in the semis, who came through a tricky encounter against Altrincham 2-0.

Of course, Spennymoor lifted the FA Vase back in 2013 when they beat Tunbridge Wells on the hallowed turf.

The Vase is also down to the final four. There was late drama at Whistable Town where a 2,656 crowd saw the hosts come from 2-0 down to win 3-2 when Harry Smith converted the rebound of his own penalty.

"It was an unbelievable turnaround from being 2-0 down," manager Jamie Coyle said. "To turn that around and into a win, that's testament to the players."

They have been drawn against Hartpury University for the two-legged semi-finals, with Andover New Street making the most of their reprieve earlier in the competition to reach this stage and set-up a semi with AFC Whyteleafe.

Wembley awaits on Sunday, May 11. We're close to knowing which two teams will be there.

Rossington Main was established in 1919, and their FA Cup debut took place in 1921. They participated in the FA Cup until the Second World War and reached their best run in 1924. making it to the fourth qualifying Round but ultimately losing 0-3 to Lincoln City. In 1923, the club relocated to their current ground at Oxford

Street. A few years later, they had their most successful FA Cup run against Lincoln City.



The club operated as Rossington Colliery for 30 years and experienced their most triumphant season after

World War II when they won both the Doncaster Senior League and Cup, earning the nickname "Doncaster Double" in 1944/45.

In 1948, due to nationalisation of the mines, the club underwent a name change to Rossington Miners Welfare and claimed the Doncaster Senior League Premier Division Cup in 1974.

In the 1980s and 90s, they changed their name to Rossington Main and became founding members of the Central Midlands League. They achieved success by winning the Premier Division and

Premier Division Cup in their second year.

In 1984, floodlights were erected at Oxford Street, which have been upgraded to new LED lights, making

them one of the best floodlight installations in the league.

In 1991, new changing rooms were built at Oxford Street, and a crowd of 1,200 attended the inaugural match against Leeds United. That same year, the club earned promotion to the NCEL (Northern Counties East League) and has remained in the same division until 2023.

Currently, Rossington Main is managed by local talent Ben Hunter, who took charge of the club in 2019 and was assisted by Matt Ellison and Sam Parkin, who brought in a group of promising young footballers. The team has been steadily progressing, playing attractive football, and building on their achievements each season.

In 2022, Rosso had a successful season in the NCEL Division One, finishing 5th in the league with 81 points from 40 games. However, they lost 2-0 in the play-off semi-final against North Ferriby F.C. For the 2022/23 season, Hunter made changes to his backroom staff, with another local lad Mick Fraser being appointed as assistant manager.

The team achieved promotion to Non-League

step 5 for the first time in the club's history after winning the Division One play-offs, defeating Horbury Town 3-1 at home in front of a record league competition crowd of 1164

spectators.

The start of the 2023/24 season saw Rosso set a record attendance of 1,697 in a pre-season friendly against Doncaster Rovers. Shortly into the season Hunter then appointed Zeph Thomas as assistant manager. In what was Rosso's debut season in the NCEL Premier at Non-League step 5, Rosso recorded their highest ever league finish in 4th but later lost in the play-off semi-final against Garforth Town on penalties after a 0-0 draw away from home.

Rosso also reached the semi-final of the NCEL Cup for the first time but was knocked out by the league champions Emley AFC.

During August 2024, Fraser returned as assistant manager following Thomas leaving to become the manager of new NCEL Division One club Dearne & District. The next month in early September Hunter stepped down as manager and club captain Greg Young was assigned as interim manager. After five games in charge with three wins out of five, Young was given the job on a permanent basis in early October 2024.

The tragic death of James By Darren Stockdale Hitchcock has really

shown the good spirit and kind nature of many clubs in the NCEL. Our last home game against Penistone Church was another of those occasions. 

Almost in France

Sometimes, a face doesn't fit at a football club. It doesn't mean there's anything wrong with the face, or anything wrong with the club. The two have simply crossed paths and tried, but it hasn't worked out. In 1973, Brian Clough had just lost in the semi-final of the European Cup with a Derby side he had taken from obscurity in the Second Division to League Champions. And as a result of his outburst on the Michael Parkinson show, he lost his job in the East Midlands. Unable to go long without work or without football, he waited for the offers to roll in. They didn't and a few days later he accepted the most unlikely of assignments; Brighton. As his character in The Damned United opined: 'look where we are! We're almost in Francel'

Mike Bamber had taken over as chairman of Brighton and Hove Albion at the end of 1972, and like Clough was restless when not working. He owned property, a nightclub, a farm, and of course the club and presumably saw



something of a kindred spirit in Clough; both born in the difficulty of the Great Depression, both fighting their way to the top, both still somewhat outcasts. And he had seen what had been achieved at Derby, and wanted some of that on the south coast. When the great and the good of the



English game felt too alienated by Clough's outbursts to take a chance on him, Bamber did. It was a bit like Jurgen Klopp turning up in League One.

Bamber must have known he was being used as a stepping stone. Clough would later write in his biography that nobody went to Brighton for the football. But he was an ambitious chairman, and for as long as he could have the golden boy, he'd take him. But Clough's reign did not get off to the most auspicious of starts. He only won one of his first ten games in charge in the Third Division, including an 8-2 thrashing as the club lurched into a relegation battle. The belated addition of Peter Taylor, Clough's partner in crime, did little to change that form. But Bamber was



determined, and with Taylor spotting talent and Clough wanting it, he signed the cheques. A lot of cheques. A reported £250,000 went out of the club within the year of Clough's tenure. By the turn of the year, they were beginning to show results.



In the final game of 1973, Brighton huffed and puffed their way to a 1-0 win over Plymouth Argyle. It wasn't much, but it was only Clough's second victory on the south coast and it was something to build on. In the new year, they went on a run of one defeat in 12 as they lifted themselves to the comfort of mid-table. With the management pair eyeing a top half finish, they travelled to Shrewsbury as the form team in the division. But it was a false dawn. They lost, and patchy form saw them slide down the table once more. A small revival in April ended any latent relegation fears, but the club finished 19th, despite their high profile manager and high level of investment.



It's an unremarkable story. That summer, Leeds manager Don Revie took the England job, and Clough moved on to the best job in the country, where he failed abysmally. It was a job he had to take, but at the top table of English football, back in the European Cup. But it was with a heavy heart. He would say that Bamber was the best chairman he ever worked with, treating him like a king and matching his ambition. But it was the former that was perhaps a problem.

Bamber indulged Clough so completely that he never settled on the south coast. He lived in an expensive hotel room, and spent most of his time driving back up the M1 to his family. That's when he wasn't given time off to go watch boxing or go on tv or anything else he wanted. One of the great what-if's is whether Clough and Taylor could have





achieved they Nottingham Forest success on the south coast, but really, Clough was never committed to the club. Not where he wanted to be, both in terms of league position or geographical position. All the money in the world couldn't change that.

But he did lay some of the groundwork that Bamber was looking for. Taylor stayed behind for a couple of years before joining his friend in Nottingham, slowly building a side filled with quality. When he left, Bamber turned to unproven Fulham and Tottenham player Alan Mullery. He delivered the success that the fans craved, first one promotion, and then another, as Brighton reached the First Division, the year that Clough finally sated his own desire, winning the European Cup with Forest.

Which just goes to show, as the old Andre Previn sketch shows, you can have all the right notes, but not necessarily play them in the right order.


