IN last Sunday's NLP, we spoke exclusively to National League CEO Mark lves to look deeper into the national 3UP campaign, officially calling for a third promotion spot into the EFL. Backed by all 72 member clubs at Step 1 and 2 after years of planning, the proposal officially calls for a change in regulations from the current two-up system and has received widespread support from the Non-League game.

But, as we've also heard this week, the campaign has also come up against some fierce opposition and there is a lot of convincing left needed to be done if EFL clubs are to vote in favour of the proposal at the EFL's AGM this June..

lves spoke passionately the logistics behind the campaign but also warned that unless the matter is addressed now, it risks being kicked down the road for more years to come.

"Why now is a really important question," he told The NLP. "Everybody is aware we've been having conversations privately with the EFL. They've been very constructive, very amiable conversations. Then we have the Independent Football Regulator coming in. Whilst there are debates ongoing at the minute between the parliamentary houses and, potentially, up to 400 suggested amendments to the Bill that are being



discussed, what is sure is the regulator is coming into play.

"That brings in another dynamic from an EFL point of view because the EFL are saying while they're supportive in principle of this issue, they cannot take this forward until the other footballing matters are dealt with – the current discussions between the PL and the EFL over the wider distribution of monies. That's a matter for the PL and the EFL, that's not a matter for us.

"We do not see them as being interdependent to the issue of three-up. If you think about them not being able to deal with anything until the matter is resolved between the PL and the EFL, which would potentially mean the regulator, the backstop and everything else kicking into play."

The National League's plea came after a wideranging BBC Sport interview with EFL chairman Rick Parry back in November when he accepted the need for change, commenting: "we have to acknowledge the need to look downwards as well as upwards".

But as columnist Chris Dunlavy warned in our sister paper, The Football League Paper, last Sunday, finding support from EFL clubs will be far from easy.



"It's only natural to ask why turkeys would vote for Christmas, and in the short-term it's a logical argument. Nobody wants to make themselves more vulnerable to relegation," Dunlavy writes.

"So precarious are finances throughout the EFL, however, that all but the biggest clubs could become a basket case, practically overnight. Remember Bolton, or Derby? There's also a lot of money in Non-League, meaning the clubs who come up - like Stockport and Wrexham - tend to push the incumbents down. That makes relegation at least a reasonable possibility for the majority of EFL clubs and means three-up, threedown is very much in their long-term interest.

"Unfortunately, that's not how people operate. Which is why, without legislative intervention or a financial sweetener, the National League's 3UP campaign is a non-starter."

Shrewsbury Town manager Gareth Ainsworth agrees. Speaking on BBC Radio 5 Live Sport's 72+ EFL podcast last week, the former Wycombe Wanderers gave a rather damning indictment of the proposal, while voicing his annoyance at being unable to compete financially with wealthy clubs coming from Non-League such as Wrexham, Notts County and Chesterfield.



Ainsworth said: "Obviously, we're not going vote for it. Who in the right mind in the EFL will be the vote for, you know, three down, three up?

"But that National League, believe me, very strong. And often the team that do come up. They compete well. And I think that's a big argument point for them saying, look at your records, look at your Chesterfields of yours, look at your, you know, Stockports, you know.

"They've all kicked on, but it could kill some really, really big league teams. You know, you Oldhams and your Torquays. They've really found it difficult getting back in.

"Should we not look after our teams that you know, we keep going on about the teams that are struggling. We should look after our pyramid better. And the teams if a team just can't keep up financially, but no other reason than the other teams have got billionaires coming in a million is that we it's not fair that they just sink out the league and out of obscurity.

"So my argument would be, yes. These teams have done well, but have a look at the money that they've had invested in them as well."

Thackley AFC is known as "the club in the woods" because of its idyllic setting in the heart of the Bradford countryside. Thackley is a private company limited by guarantee and a true community football club because its location and standing put it at the heart of a busy and growing residential community. The area immediately surrounding the ground is used extensively as a leisure and recreational facility that attracts large numbers of our village to use the rural amenities for activities such as dog walking, bird watching, horse riding and rambling.

The club was founded in 1930 by the younger members of Thackley Wesleyan Methodist Church which follows the trend of church affiliation set by Bolton Wanderers, Manchester City and Aston Villa among others. It is rumoured that young men were encouraged, by churches, to take up football and thus refrain from frequenting public houses

Thackley has a tradition of being administered by residents of the immediate locality. One of the originators of the club in the 1930's was Arthur Hylton who lived all his life less than a mile from the ground. He was assisted by his brother, Leslie, in building up a thriving and successful club that used the village youth for their playing members. All active members of the committee, at this time, lived within walking distance of the ground and





this tradition has been maintained to the present day. Our ambitious young Chairman, for example, has spent all his life as a Thackley resident and the committee is largely made up

of people living and working within a stone's throw of the club.



Thackley's development as a thriving football club has been steady and consistent. Progressing from the Bradford Mutual Sunday School League to the County Amateur League by 1939 Thackley has seen a constant rise through the league systems, the West Yorkshire League, the Yorkshire League (in 1967) and the NCEL when it was founded in 1982. Thackley AFC has retained a Premier Division place in every season since (the





only club to have done so).

There have been many successes during Thackley's existence; County Amateur League winners five times, West Riding Challenge Cup 1964 and 1967, West Riding County Cup 1974 and 1975 and the Bradford and District Senior Cup 13 times (a competition record).

Recent achievements include; in the 2010-11 season Thackley reached the final of the West Riding County Cup but lost in extra time to Guiseley having twice held the lead. Thackley won the Toolstation NCEL Cup in two consecutive years 2011-12 and 2012-13. Thackley's nickname "The Dennyboys" refers to our ground Dennyfield which is named after our long serving groundsman George Denny who lived nearby.

Our clubhouse is named after Arthur Hylton who was secretary of Thackley during the formative years from the 1940's until the 1970's. Arthur's contribution to the development of Thackley Football Club was greatly influential. Born and raised in Thackley he remained a loyal and regular contributor to the club until his death. Thackley has a history of long serving secretaries. Stewart Willingham, who has now retired from the post and is now club president, took up his responsibilities in 1973 and was still going strong until 2016, a total of 43 years at the helm of a club





at this level! Stewart was able to sustain this commitment because of the support he received from his better half, June, now sadly, no longer with us. The hospitality suite in the clubhouse is named in honour of Stewart and June, the Willingham Suite. At the beginning of the season Stewart received a long service award presented by the FA for his invaluable contribution to grass roots football and Thackley in particular.

The season 2016-17 saw a record points haul for the Dennyboys - 78 points - and resulted in 5th place finish in the League. This success was short lived, in the 2017-18 and 2018-19 seasons Thackley finished below mid-table in 15th position. 2019 -20 was incomplete with Thackley, once again in the lower half of the table when games were suspended.

Thackley continued last season, 2021-22 very much in the vein of the previous three finishing in a disappointing 17th position. Although they went out of the two National cup competitions early, they achieved some success in the County Cup and reached the guarter final of the League Cup.

Thackley has a tradition that provides playing facilities for members of the community and this season we retain our Ladies' team which makes an important contribution to football both at the





club and in the surrounding catchment area.

23rd November last year, but storm Bert cancelled it through rain. It's a shame we couldn't have had a badly-named storm cancel our last home game. Trivia



The Fiery Spear

When Ephraim Matsilele Sono was born in Soweto in 1955, he was born into a world of racist segregation that immediately limited his life chances. Even so, it seemed that his would be a childhood blessed with opportunity. 'Jomo' Sono, as he would become known, was the son of the captain of South Africa's biggest and best team, the Orlando Pirates, and grew up in a loving family. But at the age of just eight, his father died in a car crash. Rocked by this tragedy, his mother abandoned him and his brother to the care of his elderly, unwell grandparents. It was the difficult start of a journey into stardom.

Without his father's income, school needed to be paid for. Jomo took to selling peanuts and fruit around the town, quickly irritating local businesses and residents with his cheeky attempts to short-change customers or set up shop in places that would cause a nuisance. But it was exactly this practice that earned him his big break. He struggled along for five years,

before trying to sneak into an annual Orlando Pirates friendly to sell his wares. The Pirates' coach had known Sono senior in his playing days, and

recognised young Jomo. The team was a player short, and he asked Jomo to fill in. Apples and nuts forgotten, the small, skinny teenager took to the field. 90 minutes later, he had scored two goals, outperformed his professional teammates, and caught the attention of South Africa's biggest clubs. But there was no question, he would follow in his father's footsteps, at least at first.

He was a dribbler with a fiery temper, the kind of player that fans fall in love with. He had clearly inherited his father's talent, and at just 16 he was exciting his adoring public, complementing a cavalier Pirates attack that was less concerned with stopping the other team scoring, as long as they got more. His nickname, 'Jomo' translates as 'fiery spear'. It was a fitting moniker for his playing style.



The Soweto side were causing quite a stir in a divided country. The national side was selected only from the white players in the white-only league, but the Soweto side were more than capable of pulling in tens of thousands of fans. In 1974, they won the league at a canter, as well as all three national trophies. Jomo was that standout star in a team of talent. At the age of just 18, he had won all there was to win with his father's side.

In 1976, in an attempt to appease FIFA, South Africa put up an interracial XI to play against Argentina, who two years later would win the World Cup. Jomo was called up, and cemented his reputation on a global stage with four goals, in a 5-0 victory. His talent was recognised by the world's biggest clubs, but only one had the stars he had always dreamed of playing with.

When Jomo landed in New York in 1977, the Cosmos added him to a team boasting Carlos Alberto, Franz Beckenbauer, and Pele. He encountered two problems in his new home. The first was the snow, something he had never encountered at home. The second was the language barrier. Jomo had, out of embarrassment, pretended he didn't speak English. It was farcical, but it also allowed him to hear the racism others believed he didn't understand. After 12 months, he moved on to Colorado.



Back in his homeland, the apartheid government was beginning to realise that the odd exhibition and lip service to equality wasn't going to satisfy FIFA. They were fearful that mixing races within the teams would prove the obvious inferiority of the white players and cause the whole situation to erupt. So when Orlando opened their new stadium, an invite for a friendly was extended to white champions Highlands Park. With reluctance, the Afrikaner government allowed them to accept.

Unfortunately for expectant fans, Jomo made clear that he was getting married on the day of the historic match and wouldn't play. Even Desmond Tutu was asked to change the superstar's mind, but he wouldn't budge.



As the ceremony finished, Jomo was informed that his old side were 2-0 down at half time. He was only five miles away, and an emergency meeting was held with his father-in-law. And so, at half time, Jomo appeared at the stadium, still in his tuxedo. He changed into the all-black strip, and ran out onto the pitch, to the shock and delight of the fans. Inevitably, his fairytale return saw him change the game, setting up three goals and scoring one as Orlando came back to win 4-2. His trademark celebration, a joyous leap with one arm in the air, was adjusted for the occasion. This time, he had both arms in the air, the second one for his new wife.

He returned to America for a few years, before retiring and buying Highlands Park, changing the club in his image. When apartheid ended, he was made technical director of the national side. Twelve years later, after a disastrous spell under Carlos Queiroz, he took the helm and became the first South Africa manager to win a World Cup game.

Jomo didn't just play for the Cosmos. He is a star.
